Pablo Sierra gave to me the gift of his friendship. We shared assistance and management activities at the time that the Austral University Hospital was having it foundation laid; in both he left me the remaining memory that only exemplary persons can—virtuous at the time of practicing medicine, prudent at the time of giving on opinion, a loyal friend and a joyful mate.
